GENERAL PROHIBITIONS AND REQUIREMENTS

- No person shall bring or have present an animal on the fairgrounds during a fair which is not qualified under NYS regulations.
- No person shall present an interstate or intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection that has been altered by anyone other than the issuing veterinarian.
- Animals demonstrating clinical signs or other evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall not be allowed on the fairgrounds during a fair.
- Representatives of the Commissioner may deny admission to, or require removal from, the fair premises or require the segregation of any animal showing signs of or exposed to any infectious, contagious or communicable disease.

NOTE: The fair board of directors has the authority to reject unworthy or unsightly exhibits for reasons other than infectious, contagious or communicable disease (Part 350.10). The state veterinarian or animal health inspector will bring questionable exhibits to the attention of the fair board.

- All animals presented that originate from a location other than New York shall meet all New York State importation regulations appropriate to the species in addition to the fair animal health requirements.

CERTIFICATES OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (CVI)

- Cattle, sheep, goats, swine, llamas, alpacas, deer, and misc. ruminants require a valid CVI to enter the fairgrounds.
- The CVI must be issued by a Category 2 accredited veterinarian.
- All animals must be officially identified. ALL MANMADE ID MUST BE RECORDED. Refer to Animal Identification section below for more information.
- Only one species is allowed per certificate.
- The type and duration of certificate required depends on the origin of the livestock.

NEW YORK ORIGIN LIVESTOCK:

- A valid intrastate CVI (AI-61) is required.
- Each animal must be individually identified on the CVI (see below).
- The CVI must be issued on or after May 1 of the current year.

OUT OF STATE ORIGIN LIVESTOCK:

- All animals entering New York State must satisfy import health and test requirements for that species and be accompanied by a valid interstate CVI.
- The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of CVI inspection. During the fair season (July 1 through Labor Day) valid CVI's can be used multiple times for entrance into fairs. The initial entrance into a NY fair must be within 30 days of the date of CVI inspection. In order for the CVI to be used for a later fair, it must be dated and initialed by a NY state official noting the location of the initial fair. A change in health status or eligibility of an animal necessitates the generation of a new CVI.

ANIMAL IDENTIFICATION

- ALL MANMADE ID MUST BE RECORDED
- Cattle must be identified by an official USDA approved ear tag. Radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tags, commonly referred to as "840 RFID tags," are strongly recommended.
- Sheep and goats must be identified by official scrapie identification (see sheep and goat sections below).
- Swine must be identified by an official USDA approved ear tag. Radio frequency identification (RFID) ear tags, commonly referred to as "840 RFID tags," are strongly recommended. Nursing piglets do not have to be individually identified if the sow is correctly identified on the CVI and the number of piglets in the litter is noted on the CVI.
- Llamas and alpacas must be identified by official ear tag or microchip.
- Misc. ruminants must be identified by unique ear tag or microchip.
- A complete written description is sufficient identification for horses entering New York accompanied by a CVI. The description must match the EIA test record. Horse sketches and descriptions should reference color pattern, hair whorls, chestnuts, scars, and other markings as necessary to uniquely identify the horse. Tattoos and microchips if any should be included. "Bay, no markings" is not an acceptable description for a CVI or EIA test record.

NOTE: If you are exhibiting animals identified by microchip, a working reader must be supplied by the exhibitor.

RABIES VACCINATION

- Rabies vaccination is required for all species for which there is a USDA licensed vaccine available (cattle, horses, sheep, dog, cat, ferret) and that are 4 months of age or older on the date of admission to the fair.
For most rabies vaccines, the earliest age allowable for primary vaccination is 3 months. Animals that are vaccinated prior to 3 months of age will need to be re-vaccinated according to label before entering the fairgrounds.
- Vaccine must have been administered within the past 12 months. The exception is Imrab LA vaccine used in sheep which protects for 3 years after the second annual vaccination (consult your veterinarian).
- The rabies vaccination requirement must be met on the day of admission even if the animal was previously admitted to a fair when too young to vaccinate.

NOTE: Individual fairs can require animals for which there is no approved rabies vaccine to be vaccinated for rabies. The requirements outlined above would apply. The fair is responsible for notifying exhibitors. The New York State Fair requires rabies vaccination for all livestock species entering the grounds.

ACCEPTABLE PROOF OF RABIES VACCINATION

- Acceptable proof of rabies vaccination must include a signed written statement from the veterinarian administering the vaccine or a valid certificate of veterinary inspection that has the vaccination listed and is signed by the Category 2 accredited veterinarian.
- Acceptable proof of rabies vaccination must include the name of the product used, the date of administration, and the duration of immunity if longer than one year.
- If the statement of rabies vaccination is included on an EIA test record, it must be signed separately in addition to the required EIA test record signature.

NOTE: Rabies titers are not acceptable proof of rabies protection and cannot be used to meet entry requirements.

- Acceptable proof of vaccination for dogs is a valid vaccination certificate or a copy of the dog license that contains the rabies vaccination information.

BVD-PI TESTING

- All cattle, llamas, and alpacas exhibited at NY county fairs or the

State Fair must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). The testing veterinarian is responsible to make sure the proper test is conducted. This is a once in a lifetime test that must be reported on the required certificate of veterinary inspection. The issuing veterinarian is responsible for verifying the validity of the test, the identification of the animal, and recording the test date on the CVI. If a previous test is not verifiable the test must be repeated.

CLEANING AND DISINFECTION

- All buildings on the fairgrounds housing animals must be cleaned and disinfected prior to the opening of the fair and between groups of animals when housing is rotated (Section 50.2 of Agriculture and Market regulations).

ANIMAL DEATHS

- Occasionally animal deaths occur at a fair. If a death occurs it must be reported to the state veterinarian in charge as soon as possible for review. The animal must be promptly removed from the public exhibit area to a secure location and held for the veterinarian prior to disposal.

CALVING, KIDDING, AND LAMBING

- Any cattle, goats, or sheep that calve, kid, or lamb while at a county fair or the State Fair will be ordered removed from the fairgrounds along with their offspring, unless the animals are part of a birthing demonstration.

COMMINGLING OF SHEEP AND CATTLE

- Due to the potential spread of malignant catarrhal fever from sheep to cattle, it is strongly recommended that cattle be kept separate from sheep.

COMMINGLING OF SWINE AND POULTRY

- Due to the potential spread of influenza virus, it is recommended that swine and poultry be housed in separate locations.

ISOLATION ON RETURNING HOME

- The owner or custodian shall keep show animals biologically separate from the herd or flock for a period of at least two weeks after returning to the premises of origin. If any illness is noted in the exhibition animals, the owner should contact their veterinarian immediately.

INDIVIDUAL SPECIES REQUIREMENTS

Horses

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) is not required for New York origin horses. CVI is required for imported horses. Extended Equine CVIs (EECVIs) are acceptable. For more information on EECVIs, visit <http://www.globalvetlink.com>.
- Negative Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test is required for all horses 6 months of age or older. The horse must be accompanied by a valid negative EIA test record, signed by a Category 2 accredited veterinarian. The sample collection date for the qualifying EIA test must have been on or after January 1, 2021 for New York origin horses. For imported horses, the EIA test must have been conducted within 12 months prior to entry. The EIA test certificate must include a complete description of the horse.
- Rabies vaccination within 12 months is required for all horses 4 months of age or older (see above).

Cattle

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. See Animal Identification section above.
- Rabies vaccination is required for all cattle 4 months of age or older (see above).
- All cattle must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). The date and results of the testing must be noted on the certificate of veterinary inspection.
- All cattle must be vaccinated against bovine respiratory disease complex including bovine respiratory syncytial virus, bovine virus diarrhea, infectious bovine rhinotracheitis and parainfluenza with a product administered in a manner and time frame adequate to confer protective immunity for these diseases for the duration of the fair.

Sheep

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually

identified with USDA approved scrapie identification.

Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible USDA approved flock tattoo and individual animal ID number or 3) electronic implant device (microchip) if the sheep is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program. For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 1-866-USDA-TAG (1-866-873-2824).

- Rabies vaccination is required for all sheep 4 months of age or older (see above).
- The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing Category 2 accredited veterinarian that the flock of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious or communicable diseases was found.
- If evidence of soremouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any sheep, the entire exhibit including the affected animals shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.

Goats

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved scrapie identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible registration tattoo or 3) a legible USDA approved herd tattoo and individual animal ID number or 4) electronic implant device (microchip) if the goat is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program and/or the electronic implant ID is recorded on the goat's registration paper. For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 1-866-USDA-TAG (1-866-873-2824).
- The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing Category 2 accredited veterinarian that the herd of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious or communicable diseases was found.
- If evidence of soremouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any goat, the entire exhibit including the affected animals shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.

Swine

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. See Animal Identification section above.

Llamas and Alpacas

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. See Animal Identification section above.
- All llamas and alpacas must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). The date and results of the testing must be noted on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

Poultry

- Poultry (with the exception of doves, pigeons and waterfowl) must be accompanied by 1) results of a negative pullorum typhoid test conducted within 90 days prior to exhibition OR 2) proof that the birds originated directly from a US pullorum-typhoid clean flock or equivalent flock.
- Poultry qualified by 90-day test must be identified by official leg band.
- Proof of NPIP status must be in the form of an NPIP certificate or purchase receipt containing NPIP certification information. If utilizing a receipt, it must be dated within 1 year of the date of admission to the fair.

Deer/Elk (Cervidae)

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. See Animal Identification section above.
- Originate from a herd classified as accredited or qualified under USDA tuberculosis regulations.
- A movement permit obtained from the Division of Animal Industry is required for all deer movements. All CWD and TB program requirements must be met before a permit will be issued. Questions regarding movement permits should be directed to the Division of Animal Industry at 518-457-3502.

Miscellaneous Ruminants

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. See Animal Identification section above. AI-202(2022)

County Fair Procedures

- Project Evaluation Day – All 4-H Clubs will have their exhibits evaluated from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM on Saturday, July 8th.
- Horticulture and Foods judging will be on Thursday, July 13th at 6:00 PM.
- All booths are to be ready for display by 6:00 PM Saturday, July 15th.
- Animals are not permitted on the fairgrounds prior to posted barn openings, see *Extension Connection* for details.
- All market animals will be weighed-in during official 4-H weighing times.
- All 4-H animals must be in place by 12:00 Noon, Sunday, July 16th.
- Animal Exhibitors meeting 7:15 PM., Sunday, July 16th. (Main Show arena)
- No 4-H animals can be weighed on official 4-H scales prior to the assigned weigh-in.
- **All Fair Voucher/Entry Forms must be received in the 4-H Office by 4:30pm by Wednesday, June 14th, 2023.**
- 4-H projects from the Youth Building will be released Monday, July 24th from 1:00 PM– 6:00 PM.
- The 4-H Snack Bar will be providing reasonably priced meals. 4-H Snack Bar procedures and hours of operations will be posted at the fair.

4-H BOOTHS AT COUNTY FAIR

1. All entries in the 4-H Building will be exhibited by 4-H Clubs as a Booth Display. Food entries will be displayed by a photo, recipe card and ribbon only.
2. Clubs are encouraged to decorate their booth with a club sign or banner. Tell what city or town you are from. Also include leaders name, club contact information, and list of members.
3. Each club should have a rope or fence in front of the booth to discourage the public from entering. Be sure it will withstand a week at the Fair, and is fastened securely! Tables are **NOT** provided for booths.
4. If you use electricity (as noted on your Booth Reservation Form), the switch should be easily accessible to Building Superintendents to turn off and on when building is open.
5. Clubs need to check fair booths **each day**– replace tape, water plants, etc. Your booth needs to look as fresh and as nice the last day is it did on the day of judging. Remember, you are selling YOUR club to the public.
6. Ribbons will be attached to exhibits.
7. Items that do not meet Fair Book rules or are evaluated unworthy should be taken home and not displayed at the Fair.
8. Project evaluation will be Saturday, July 8th, 9:00 AM– 1:00 PM in the 4-H Building. 4-H'ers will be encouraged to take their entries to the club booth immediately after evaluation.
9. All Club Booths must be finished and ready for display by 6:00 PM Saturday, July 15th.
10. An area will be available for lone members to display their projects. Lone members will be responsible for decorating their display area.
11. A voucher must be completed by each club. See pg. 30 for classes.
12. 4-H Club members are expected to take an active role in decorating their club booths. **Leaders and parents should not be setting up their entire booth.**
13. Booths will be judged for clarity of message, attractiveness, use of appropriate theme (symbols and models) and attention getting power. The booth theme is "Stay Rooted in 4-H".
14. Number of exhibits will not be a factor in judging. Each 4-H Club and Cloverbud Club will receive \$20 for their club displays. NOTE: In order to receive the \$20 premium, Cloverbud Clubs must have **at least 5 members** exhibiting projects at the Fair. If there are only 5 members in the 4-H Cloverbud Club, 4-H members must have projects on display.
15. Cloverbuds do not receive premiums.
16. **Booth Judging: Must be added to the Club voucher– see Department 12– Section Y for Class information.** 4-H Club cash awards and rosettes are as follows:

- **Division A– 4-H Clubs with 20 or more members as of May 1.**
- 1st place-\$50.00, 2nd place- \$45.00, 3rd place \$40.00, 4th place- \$35.00
- **Division B– 4-H Clubs with less than 20 members but more than 10 as of May 1.**
- 1st place- \$25.00, 2nd place- \$20.00, 3rd place- \$15.00, 4th place- \$10.00
- **Division C– 4-H Clubs with at least 5 members, but with 10 or less members as of May 1.**
- 1st place- \$15.00, 2nd place- \$10.00, 3rd place- \$5.00, 4th place- \$5.00
- 4-Hers are encouraged to enter only high quality projects which are appropriate for their age and ability.

4-H JUNIOR SUPERINTENDENTS

Junior Superintendents will assist in supervising exhibits, setting up, assisting on evaluation day, scoring herdsmanship, working with younger exhibitors, etc. Some of the Junior Superintendents in the animal departments may be required to stay overnight in the barns.

Junior Superintendents Rewards:

1. Incentives distributed by committees
2. Fair Pass for the week
3. Junior Superintendents for the Snack Bar will receive up to \$45 based on the official Snack Bar work week to cover travel expenses. A schedule will be arranged with an Adult Manager prior to Fair.
4. The satisfaction of helping others enjoy the experience of County Fair.

ATTENTION 4-H PARENTS

We recognize and appreciate the importance of parental interest and cooperation in assisting 4-H members in making out entries and getting exhibits to the fair. However, we ask that parents remember that this is a 4-H boys' and girls' show, conducted for their education and to show the public what they have done. We strongly recommend that the placing of exhibits, feeding, fitting and grooming of animals be handled **entirely** by the 4-H'ers while at the Fair. Thank you for your cooperation.

FAIR PASS POLICY FOR 4-H EXHIBITORS

It would be nice if everyone could have a pass to the Fair. However, this is not possible. We suggest each member, parent and leader read this policy very carefully before exhibiting at the Fair, as submission of entries indicates acceptance of the policy.

1. Livestock exhibitors in Departments 1-10 having animals housed on the fairgrounds will receive one wrist band regardless of the number of animals entered.
 - Wristbands will be worn all week
 - Wristbands will be distributed at the General Barn Meeting, Sunday, July 16th.
 - If you lose your wristband, there will be a \$5.00 fee to replace it. If your wristband breaks, it will be replaced without cost if you return the broken wristband.
2. There will be no passes distributed to members exhibiting in Department 12 except for members participating in judging contests, volunteering at the snack bar or special programs. (At this time all gates are open for exhibitors). Exhibits may be picked up between 1-6:00 PM on Monday, July 24th.
3. All 4-H exhibitors and their families should enter and exit the fairgrounds, at all times, through the far western gate (the back gate on the corner of the fairground property). This gate will be open and available to the parents of animal exhibitors until 9:00 AM. **DO NOT block driveways or entrances into barns.**
4. Parking passes will be distributed one (1) gate pass per family. All additional passes must be obtained from the Fair Office.

4-H BARN EXHIBIT CONTEST

The 4-H Barn Exhibit contest is designated to promote an attractive and educational display in the animal barn areas. There will be two categories: Small Group of 1-3 team members and Large Group of 4 or more team members. Top three exhibits will be placed in each category. One team leader should be designated as premium recipient and enter the team for judging. Team leader must list team members and which animal barn in entry description. Premiums for award are \$30.00 for first place, \$20 for second place, and \$10 for third place.

Judging will be based on the overall exhibit including team banner, identification of participating member(s) by stall or entry cards or signs, educational information for the public, neat appearance, eye catching appeal. **Barn exhibits must be ready for judging by 6:00 PM, Sunday, July 16th.**

Selection will be made by a judge contracted through the 4-H Office.

ANIMAL EXHIBITORS

All animal exhibitors must complete, sign and return the Parental Form in this book. Form must be received in the 4-H Office by June 16th!!! **IF FAIR VOUCHER/ENTRY IS NOT RECEIVED IN THE 4-H OFFICE BY 4:30PM, WEDNESDAY, JUNE 14th, 4-H'ER WILL NOT BE ABLE TO SHOW THEIR ANIMAL(S).**

General Regulations for all 4-H Animal Exhibitors

1. Vouchers must be received in the 4-H Office by 4:30 PM, Wednesday, June 14th. FAIR VOUCHERS RECEIVED AFTER THIS DATE WILL BE REFUSED. **Note:** IF FOR SOME REASON AN ANIMAL CANNOT BE EXHIBITED DUE TO HEALTH AND IT'S THE ONLY ANIMAL THE EXHIBITOR OWNS, THE ANIMAL MAY BE REPLACED WITH ANOTHER ANIMAL AFTER THE ENTRY DEADLINE. PROOF MUST BE PROVIDED BY A LICENSED VETERINARIAN.

2. Animals must be owned by the exhibitor. Some types of animals may be borrowed or leased if proper paperwork was filed by May 15th at the 4-H Office. Dairy must be in by June 1st. Market animals must be owned by the exhibitor.

3. **Animals must stay on the fairgrounds for the entire week** and be cared for by the exhibitor to be eligible for show and premiums. All animals must remain on the fairgrounds until Sunday, July 23rd at 3:00 PM. **Failure to meet this requirement will result in forfeiture of your premium check and the fair board holds the rights to refuse participation at fair going forward.** 4-H market animals that have been sold through the Meat Animal Sale will only be the ONLY animals permitted to be loaded on trucks for the slaughter facilities on **Sunday morning**. All remaining 4-H animals must remain on the Fairgrounds until release at **3:00 PM on Sunday**.

4. Exhibitors will provide their own trucking, feed, hay, and bedding.

5. Exhibitors must show their own animals with the following exceptions:

- A. If there are two animals in the same class, another 4-H'er may show the other animal.
- B. In cases of illness, family emergency, out-of-town travel etc., another Chautauqua County 4-H'er may show your animals in regular judging classes. However, in showmanship classes the exhibitor must show his/her own animal (The purpose of the 4-H program is to teach a sense of responsibility through the daily care and training of one's animal).

6. Animals must be trained to lead and/or be under control while in the show ring. Untrained or out of control animals will be excused from the show, Sale and Fairgrounds at the committees, superintendents, judges and Issue Leaders discretion.

7. Exhibitors may wear clothing of any color when showing, but should be neat, clean, and appropriate.

8. Exhibitors must follow all project rules, including IAFE Code of Ethics (in this book). See page 31.

9. Cloverbuds will not receive premiums.

I. Showmanship

Showmanship must be entered on voucher; you must show your own animal. No premium for showmanship.

Fitting implies fitting and management, the use of proper means and methods of developing livestock and making them look attractive to the ringside, the prospective buyers, and the official judge.

In making final awards, the judges shall consider the following points:

1. Appearance of animal..... 40 points
 2. Appearance of exhibitor 10 points
 3. Presenting animal in ring..... 50 points
- TOTAL..... 100 points**

There may be additional point breakdowns in some sections.

II. Herdsman Awards

The following items may be used in determining Herdsman Awards: Each barn will share herdsman criteria with exhibitors.

1. Exhibitors are to do their own work. Excessive parental, leader, or friend involvement will result in points off.
2. Neatly printed stall cards above each animal.
3. Animals clean and storage area and aisles clean and orderly.
4. Grain, hay, and straw stored neatly.
5. All equipment in proper place
6. Avoidance of excessive use and waste of feed and bedding.
7. Appearance and conduct of exhibitor.
8. Willingness of exhibitor to cooperate.
9. Suitable halters used and cattle tied at proper length. Beef cattle are required to be double-tied.
10. Removal of manure from aisles and barn.
11. Advisory committees have very similar criteria for scoring. Awards will be presented at the Awards Ceremony on Saturday evening.
12. Three Herdsman Awards will be given per barn– Outstanding Jr. Superintendent, Outstanding Sr. Herdsman, and Outstanding Jr. Herdsman.

III. Exhibitor's Premium & Fees

- A. Unworthy exhibits will receive no premiums. This means exhibits not worthy of a ribbon in the show ring and exhibits scoring less than 100 points for the week in herdsman.
- B. Worthy Exhibits will receive the following premium:
 - Beef, Dairy and Horse (Stabled).....\$5.50
 - Dairy Goats, Sheep, Swine, Dogs.....\$3.50
 - Rabbits and Poultry.....\$2.00
 - Horse (Day Rider).....\$2.00

IV. Open Class

All youth exhibitors are eligible to show in open (adult) classes, however, entries and fees must be made through the open class premium book. See open class exhibitors handbook for open rules and deadlines.

V. State Fair

Blue ribbon exhibits are eligible for State Fair. Other placings may be considered in special circumstances.

All rabbits must be health inspected before entering the Rabbit & Poultry Building and being caged. Adult Superintendents and committee members will examine entries upon arrival.

- ARBA rules apply.
- Exhibitors must be certain that their rabbits are entered in the right class and the Fair Voucher/Entry Form must be received in the 4-H Office by 12:00 Noon, June 14th.
- Only rabbits entered for 4-H exhibition may be housed in the Rabbit/Poultry Barn.
- Absolutely NO additional rabbits/animals allowed in the barn after Sunday's check-in.**
- Limited bedding and water will be supplied. Bring your own food and water dishes/bottles.
- Exhibitors must clean, feed and water rabbits daily, by 10:00 AM or make arrangements with superintendents.
- Diseased or sick rabbits must be removed from the fairgrounds **immediately**, at the discretion of the Barn Supervisor
- Rabbits must be tattooed in the left ear.
- Exhibitors are responsible for carrying their own rabbits to and from the showmanship table, as they are judged.
- All judges' decisions are final.
- First year members may exhibit pet rabbits, but second year and up members must exhibit rabbits conforming to the ARBA standard for the breed. Cloverbuds may use pet rabbits.
- Pet rabbits are not eligible for BOB or BIS.
- Rabbits must be owned 60 days prior to the fair.
- No breeding of rabbits in or around 4-H barns.

- All Cloverbud rabbits will be judged together and are not eligible for individual breed awards. Participation award will be given.

All rabbits taken to the Fair must be entered as exhibits and cannot be taken home until 3:00 PM the last Sunday of the Fair. No extra rabbits are to be brought to the Fair for sale and rabbits sold at the Fair are the sole responsibility of the seller and the purchaser. No rabbits may be listed for sale until after the Monday show. Superintendents are not liable for any transactions conducted, especially by adults of 4-H'ers. Any rabbits sold at the Fair cannot go home before 3:00 PM Sunday. All kit **MUST** be 8 weeks old to sell by NY State Law. All members are required to participate in showmanship to qualify for year end awards unless you have won master showman in the past.

2023 Chautauqua County Market Animal Sale Statement & County White Ribbon Statement

I certify that any medications used in the production of my meat animal have been at the therapeutic level according to the label directions, and when necessary, under the care of a licensed veterinarian. I further certify that all withdrawal times for a drug clearance have been strictly adhered to.

I understand that I will be responsible for replacement or reimbursement of the market value of my meat animal in the event that it is discovered that my animal was subjected to illegal practices involving drugs or if withdrawal time for therapeutic drugs, growth promotions, feed additives, antibiotics or tranquilizers were not adhered to.

The animal that I am entering into a 4-H market class was raised to the best of my ability. I understand that an important outcome of the project is raising a quality meat animal. I have read and understand rule 4 of the Meat Animal Sale Program Policy which states:

“Ribbons will be awarded in all market animal classes (beef, sheep, swine, poultry and goats) by the designated judge for each species. Ribbons will be awarded based on quality and proper finish at the time of the show.”

Blue - Excellent; Red - Good; White- Possible No Sale

- Youth who receive a white ribbon for the meat animal that they may be selling in the Meat Animal Sale will receive a warning for their first offense. The youth and their family will meet with the Meat Animal Sale committee and the respective animal project committee to discuss better methods for raising an animal that is properly finished.
- If a youth receives a second white ribbon for an animal of the same species the next consecutive year on the animal that was intended to go through the Meat Animal Sale they may not be eligible to sell their animal at the Sale. They may sell the animal private treaty at the conclusion of the sale.

Example: Jimmy Smith Raises a market hog in the 2022-2023 4-H year. The judge gives Jimmy's hog a white ribbon based on the finish of his hog on show day. Jimmy is allowed to sell his hog this year. Jimmy joins the hog project the next year and again receives a white ribbon. He is not eligible to sell his animal in the meat animal sale but may sell it privately. Jimmy tries to raise a hog for the third year and again receives a white ribbon. The cycle begins again and he may sell his animal in the sale. “

The purpose of this activity is to develop youth in the knowledge and skills to identify desirable conformation traits in animals, and quality traits in plants. Judging is also an excellent means for youth to gain confidence and training in making decisions. These contests provide a means of selection of individuals to represent the county in State and National competition which is of secondary importance.

Contests are listed in the order scheduled. In addition to special awards listed below, ribbons will be provided for the top individuals and teams for both 4-H and FFA where appropriate.

RULES:

1. Open to 4-H and FFA members. Students or graduates of an agricultural college or technical school are not eligible. Time: 15 minutes will be allowed for judging each class.
2. A team will consist of at least 3 members but not more than 5 members selected by the Vo-Agr teacher or 4-H club leader. All teams' members **MUST** be from the same club or chapter. However, a contestant may be both a 4-H and FFA team. The three (3) highest scores constitute the team score. Dairy Teams may have a maximum of 4 members.
3. There will be no communication between contestants or contestant and any other person during the contest.
4. Any violation of the above rule will disqualify contestant.

- Suitable provision will be made to prevent spectators from interfering with contestants during contest.

SECTION A-4-H Gardening & Flowers Premium \$1.00

All exhibits that are judged excellent, good, or worthy.

- Exhibits must be grown as a project of the exhibitor.
- Each exhibit must be labeled with the correct variety name. Awards will be lowered unless this is stated.
- Only 1 entry per class except No. 42 where 3 miscellaneous crops may be entered.
- Flowers: Three stems shall comprise an exhibit unless otherwise noted. Flower stems should be eight inches long, except where type of flower makes this impossible. Flowers that do not last as cut flowers (hollyhock, impatiens, portulaca) may not be entered. Variety or type names must be listed for all cut flower classes. Exhibitors must furnish suitable containers.
- Flowers: Selected blue ribbon entries will qualify exhibitors to enter cut flower classes at State Fair. Blooms of flowering shrubs, other than roses and wild flowers will not be judged. The best exhibits will be selected for State Fair.

1. Tree Identification Notebook– as called for in the “Know Your Trees” project.
2. Mounted Display– Identifying at least 15 different kinds of wood found in New York woodlots, with their uses. May be made up of a small section of the trunk mounted on board.
3. Mounted display of at least 5 insects and diseases common to New York– Specimens are mounted on 8x11” cards and fastened together to allow some handling. In the case of insects, the injury to forests must be shown.
4. Bird House or Bird Feeder– Built by exhibitors enrolled in the Bird Study or Bluebird Project.
5. Trapping and Fur Management– Pelt Preparation.
 - An exhibitor may enter one, two or three pelts. Each pelt shall comprise an entry, but no more than one pelt of any one kind of animal may be entered. Maximum of 3 entries per exhibitor in this class only.
 - The dried pelt of any of the following NY furbearers, taken by legal means and prepared by the exhibitor may be entered: beaver, fox, mink, muskrat, opossum, otter, raccoon, skunk, and weasel. Pelts will be judged on: General appearance, cleanliness of leather, proper stretching and general cleanliness.
6. Trees from Seeds– Examples of seedlings, grown from seed planted by exhibitor. Exhibit will consist of 6 or more seedlings or 1 species in a flat or suitable container.
7. Nature Trail Sign– An informative sign prepared for use on an interpretive trail. It must convey a message about a plant, wildlife or other natural features. It must be durable and weatherproof.
8. Educational display or poster relating to a 4-H natural resource project– Fishing, trapping, growing trees from seeds, nature trails, wildlife, tropical fish aquarium etc. May include labeled displays of equipment, maps, photos, sketches, or models.
9. Backyard Maple Syrup– 4 oz. minimum.
10. Wreaths– Using natural resources.
11. Edible Bird Feeders. Must include recipe & process.
12. Homemade Bird Food– Must include recipe & process.
13. Other Conservation Projects.

**SECTION E– 4-H Entomology
Premium \$2.50**

Corresponds with NYS Fair Book Section I – Entomology

- Entries will be judged on the basis of requirements listed in the 4-H Entomology Project Guide M-6-1.
- Insect specimens must be properly mounted and displayed and have complete collection data. Suggested display case described in 4-H Entomology Project Guide (available through your Extension 4-H Educator) or museum size insect drawers or polystyrene insect cases covered with clear plastic sheets. Exhibits incorrectly prepared will not be evaluated.

Group A. General Insect Collections

Class Numbers

1. First Year Project Exhibits– Must include a minimum of 20 specimens representing 5 insect orders. Classification need not be taken further than order names. Insects should be pinned properly and the wings of all butterflies and moths must be spread.
2. Second Year Project Exhibits– Must include a minimum of 40 specimens representing 9 insect orders. Twenty specimens must have been collected during the current year. Twenty specimens must also be identified to common name with the name written on a label and pinned separately near the specimen (easily visible, to aid in judging). Addition of scientific names is optional in this class. Insects should be pinned properly and the wings of all butterflies and moths must be spread and at least one small insect must be mounted on a

point or minuten pin.

3. **Third Year Project Exhibits**– Must include a minimum of 60 specimens representing 12 orders. Thirty specimens must have been collected during the current year, thirty specimens must be identified to common name and at least five specimens (representing at least five families) must be identified to family. Scientific names (genus and species) should be included wherever possible, although insects from some orders will be difficult to identify to this level; common names should be placed on a separate label pinned near the specimen as in Class No. 2. Insects should be pinned properly and the wings of all butterflies and moths must be spread and at least two small insects must be mounted on points or minuten pins.
4. **Fourth Year (And Beyond) Project Exhibits**– Must consist of general collections. Must include 80 specimens representing at least 12 orders. Forty specimens must have been collected during the current year. Forty specimens must be identified to common name. At least ten specimens (representing at least 10 families) must be identified to their family. Scientific names should be included wherever possible. Common names should be placed on a separate label, pinned near the specimen as in Class No. 2. Proper mounting (pinned properly, wings of Lepidoptera spread, two small insects on points of minuten) will be strongly emphasized.

Group B. Advanced Insect Collections

Class number

5. **Advanced Collections**– For advanced collections Riker mounts may also be used. Complete collection data should accompany all exhibits (where collected, date, and by whom?); can be placed on back of exhibit as long as the evaluator can tell which label goes with each specimen. If you exchange specimens, label as completely as possible, giving location (country, state or province nearest town), date collected; name of collector, plus any ecological information available such as plant of insect host, habitat, etc. Imagination and individuality are encouraged. The rules for mounting as set up for general collections, do not have to be enhanced. The scientific aspects and educational value, appearance quality and arrangement will be evaluated. The Exhibitor Information Statement should contain educational value to you (what you learned) as well as what you see the educational value to others to be.

Group C. Club and County Exhibits

Class number

6. **Single Collections** – (prepared by the combined efforts of a club) May be any kind of insect collection or may represent a group activity that can be presented as an exhibit. Regional insect collections prepared for eventual donation to a museum may be entered in this class if prepared by more than one person; otherwise, these should be entered under Class No. 4. Evaluation will be based on number of members and completeness of exhibit.

Group D. Exhibits of Living Insects

7. **Living Insect Exhibit** - Exhibits must convey an educational message to the public and/or the educational opportunities in 4-H work in the field of Entomology. Exhibits are to be arranged by the county 4-H staff and members, and completed by the opening day of the county's time period. Those contemplating Class 8 entries must get approval from the Superintendent of Entomology, Section H. Live educational exhibits are encouraged. Possible exhibits including living adult butterflies, butterfly chrysalides from which the adults are emerging, caterpillars, ant farms and aquatic insects in water tanks. Showing of a living exhibit requires that the exhibitor be on hand to care for the needs of his or her "livestock" daily. Exhibits will be evaluated on: educational value; appearance; quality and arrangement. Those planning to prepare exhibits should first make arrangements with the Superintendent.
8. **HONEY BEE/APICULTURE EXHIBITS** - Honey – 1 pound container; Bee/Honey products made from Beeswax – Examples: candles (at least 2), lip wax; Display/Poster – Individual or Group – a series of posters/photos or three dimensional exhibit representing any aspect of Beekeeping.

Examples: equipment, disease, bee colony management; Project Record Book for 4-H Beekeeping Project. See Group D Class 7 for live exhibits. Exhibitor will be responsible for care and supervision of any live exhibit.

SECTION F– Communications & Expressive Arts Premium \$2.50 (unless otherwise noted)

Corresponds to NYS Fair Book Section C – Communications & Expressive Arts

Class Numbers

Creative Writing - Creative writing will be evaluated on content, standard punctuation and grammar, rhyme (if applicable), use of expressions, actions, dialogue and overall “tone” of the written piece. How the piece is presented and neatness and creativity of the presentation will also be considered in the evaluation. **There is a limit of six one sided pages, however if a piece is longer, the exhibitor can enter a synopsis along with the total piece. The synopsis can be no more than the six page limit. Recorded oral presentations of the work can also be submitted with the written work.**

1. **Fiction** - Writing can be presented in any form of genre such as a story, letter, poem or script for stage or screen.
2. **Non-Fiction** - In this form of creative writing, the author uses self-exploratory writing that draws on personal experiences. The format could be an autobiography, personal story, letter, poem or script for stage or screen that are based on true-life experiences for the author.
3. **Press Releases or Editorials** - Entries submitted need to demonstrate the 4-H youth member's ability to share information with the various media outlets for the purpose of informing the public about their achievements and accomplishments during the current 4-H year. If the press release was printed in the local newspaper, please include a copy of the published release, indicating date of release and title of publication.
4. **Performing Arts**
 - Exhibits should illustrate the exhibitor's involvement in performing arts. Involvement may be as a performer, technical support staff, review or observer.
 - Prop - any object or material constructed by the exhibitor for use in a production. Examples: backdrop, scenery, puppet, mask, etc. Note: Costumes are evaluated in Clothing and Textiles Classes.
 - Script - an original sketch scene or play written by the exhibitor.
 - Documentation - notebook, posters or 3 dimensional exhibits about involvement in live performances.
 - Other - any performing arts exhibitor or project falling outside the categories described above. (Provide description).

Posters and 3-Dimensional Displays - Educational posters/3-dimensional displays - Exhibit should be self-explanatory through the use of appropriate captions, signs or labels and should be limited to approximately card table size. Exhibit will be evaluated on content, illustration, organizations, clarity, visual appeal and readability. All exhibits must include a written summary to help evaluator understand purpose and/or outcome.

5. **Public Presentation Posters** - Posters must be accompanied by a descriptive summary so that evaluator clearly

- understands why/how poster was used.
6. Poster/Exhibit - Individual or Group - a series of posters (at least 14" x 22")/photos (8" x 10") or three-dimensional exhibit representing any aspect of 4-H Youth Development projects and/or activities.
 7. Displays Demonstrating the County Annual 4-H Theme (Does not qualify for NYS Fair) - Exhibitor may use any suitable materials or photographs to demonstrate to the public that 4-H can happen everywhere (literally or figuratively). Display should incorporate some text to help fairgoers understand what 4-H youth development is all about.
 8. 4-H Youth Development Banners
 - 2' x 4' minimum
 - Designed to hang vertically or horizontally or to be carried horizontally.
 - Must be equipped with a dowel on top suitable for hanging or carrying.
 - Any assembly technique can be used.
 - Must incorporate the 4-H Clover.
 9. Scrap Book - The Scrap Book reflects the use of creative scrapbooking techniques to tell about events and/or activities. The theme may be 4-H or non 4-H in nature. The Scrap Book must have been completed in the current 4-H year. Exhibits will be evaluated on overall appearance and creativity and the appropriate use of scrapbooking techniques to tell a story. If the scrap book reflects the activities of the 4-H Club, the work must be completed solely by one 4-H youth member and not be a group/club effort. Club scrap books may be entered in the open class category.
 10. Achievement/Record Notebooks - The Book is a collection of items assembled to demonstrate involvement in projects and activities during current 4-H year. Evaluators will be looking for an attractive cover and title page, a table of contents and/or the use of section dividers, and content that reflects involvement in 4-H experiences such as leadership experiences, marketing/public relations, exhibits, projects, community service, presentations, and other activities completed in the current 4-H year. All items such as ribbons, certificates and pictures displayed in the book should be labeled to reflect what experiences they relate to. The book must contain a story that summarizes the accomplishment and skills learned throughout the current year in 4-H. The inclusion of activities that are not 4-H related is acceptable but should be kept to a minimum, keeping the focus on 4-H work. **Excellent \$2.00, Good \$1.00.** Only the current year will be judged. One record book per exhibitor.
 11. Project Notebooks - 1 year project book, includes animal projects for that year \$1.00

General Public Presentations/Demonstrations: An opportunity for youth ages 8 – 19 years of age to showcase their talents. Participants may use any type of communication style: Demonstration, Illustrated Talk, Speech, Recitation, Dramatic Interpretation, to showcase their particular skills and abilities. Program is designed to attract the public to want to sit, listen and learn. This is a great opportunity to share individual/group talent with a general audience and to get people excited about 4-H.

6. Single Heavily Edited Black and White Image - Image has been radically digitally edited or enhanced. Modifications may include: addition to or the removal of parts of the image; changes in the color scheme of the image: the use of filters or effects; or animation using digital images, etc. Thumbnail of original image shall accompany exhibit.
7. Photo Study Class - You may enter only one of the following 4 photos demonstrating 4 methods of isolating the subject - not more than 3 objects permitted in each photo.
 - a. 4 close-up photos with a different main light sources in each - front, side, back and diffuse. Use flash or reflector to lighten shadows if needed
 - b. 4 photos - each to illustrate one idea - i.e., hidden lines and shapes, framing, patterns, perspective, or texture. Show differences - same topic, different location, angles, etc.
 - c. 4 photos - each illustrating a different stop action technique - horizontal action, peak of action, panning - fast shutter, panning - slow shutter.
 - d. 4 candid photos of individual people or groups - doing something.
 - e. 4 part photo sports story - spectator reaction, player reaction, peak of action, scoreboard, etc. If push processing is used, indicate it on the technical data information.
 - f. 3 Photos of Some Nearby Subject - From 3 different levels: normal, high and low.
8. Photo Story - Narrative or informational presentation using images as illustrations to communicate story or ideas. Consists of 4 to 8 photographs with identifying or informational captions to tell a story or document a process. Exhibit may include a short narrative telling the story that the images are illustrating. Some photo stories require a supporting narrative; conversely; most narratives work if better supported by a

- group of images.
9. 2-6 Photos Illustrating Special Efforts Techniques– i.e., zooming, double exposure, soft focus, painting with light, false perspective, etc.
 10. 1-3 Photographs– A scene using objects and/or paper cutouts; using translucent objects; show black, white, and grey areas.
 11. Using Images– A short statement, story, poem, or article using one or more digital images to illustrate, visually explain or enhance its meaning.

All food entries must be on disposable plates and enclosed in a plastic bag. Pies may be entered in glass or metal pie pans to encourage a quality crust – be sure and label your pie pan with name, address, phone number and club name.
- All baked entries must have been baked from scratch by the exhibitor. No ready made refrigerated or frozen dough, pastry crust, wafer chocolate, or store bought crusts.
- Entree entries should consist of a minimum of 50% made from scratch ingredients, for example lasagna with store bought noodles should contain homemade sauce and seasoning.
- Only one product can be entered in each class; no more than three classes per category.
- All 4-H members exhibiting in the FOODS section must enter at least one item from the project in which they are currently enrolled, and meet all other requirements in the Family and Consumer Science Food Rules and Regulations.
- Food exhibits will be donated to the 4-H judges' dinner or returned to exhibitor. **ONLY RIBBONS, RECIPE CARDS AND PHOTOS ARE TO BE DISPLAYED IN THE BOOTHS.**
- Do not enter rolls, muffins or cupcakes in paper backing cups. Baked goods should be cooled before packing.
- Do not bring food entries containing raw eggs. The N.Y.S. Health Department recommends all foods containing eggs should be thoroughly cooked.
- **Let's not poison anyone! Please bring spoilable foods thoroughly hot or well chilled.** Judges will take temperatures of foods. **They should be under 40 degrees or over 140 degrees.** The judge can refuse any entry they feel may not be safe. If you have questions– call the 4-H Office.

2. **Heritage Recipe Collection**– An exhibit is at least 10 recipes (displayed in box, notebook, or file folder; can include photos or illustrations) that depicts family or local history. For each recipe state: (1) source of recipe; (2) history related to recipe; (3) traditions related to preparing, serving, and eating the food. For 4 of the 10 recipes, indicate how well it was liked after making it. The collection should represent one or more generations older than yourself and can be collected from family, friends, or other community sources. All recipes must be collected and at least four prepared during the current enrollment year. **Premium \$2.00**
3. **Educational Poster** An exhibit is a single poster (14" x 22", minimum size) on any aspect of foods or nutrition. Examples include messages that promote: Dietary Guidelines or MyPlate; physical activity; food safety; reading labels and making ingredient choices; or other food and nutrition messages. Entries will be evaluated on the basis of content, composition, and effectiveness. **Premium \$2.00**
4. **Education Exhibit**– An exhibit is a series of 3 or more posters

1. Constructed Projects with Manufactured Components General Information: Youth entering projects in the following classes use manufactured construction pieces to complete projects. Examples are Lego*, K'nex*, Brio*, and Mechano*, but projects are not limited to these examples. Projects can incorporate design, following instructions, three-dimensional thinking, design modifications, problem solving, and creativity, architecture, and structural design, principles of mechanics and use of color in the planning and design process. These skills relate to the professions of engineering, science construction, architecture and art. Judging will be based on completion, complexity, presentation, and explanation of design, understanding of principles and visual presentations.

MUST INCLUDE FOLLOWING:

- a. Number of pieces: Youth must know the approximate number of pieces used in assembly. For kits, this number is on the box. It is understood that after a long creative process, it may be difficult to know exact number of small pieces; the youth must provide an estimate rounded to 25.
- b. Diagram: Diagrams are required. A diagram could be a photograph printed on printer paper, a scale drawing on graph paper, a photocopy of an instruction sheet or a variable scale rough drawing. Relevant labels and explanation must be added. The diagram must include: 1. Name of youth; 2. The title of project; 3. the exact or approximate number of pieces and 4. a self-judgment of complexity level (a. easy – less than one hour to assemble; medium – 1-3 hours construction time or c. complex – more than 3 hours of construction time). Junior may use a photocopy of kit provided drawings for basis of their diagrams, but brand logo MUST be covered and not visible. The diagram can be displayed in a plastic stand, mounted on poster board or

attached in a folder. Art value, ability or written work to attract, use of color and use of font add to design presentation.

2. Kit: Restricted to juniors (ages 8-13) and exhibitors are limited to two projects in this class. If two projects are entered, they must differ significantly. Youth must enter a completed kit. Original story must describe design process and play with model. Judging criteria: completion, complexity (number of pieces), diagram (of completed model and key elements labeled), explanation/story (explanation of the design process, difficulties, and interesting elements; describe play value, what steps could be taken to improve model) and overall presentation.
3. Original Model: Youth are limited to two projects in this class, projects must differ significantly. The project can be a scene, diorama, model, building, vehicle, plants or creature. Judging criteria: completion, design (number of pieces, moving parts – gear systems, axle systems (wheels), hidden entrances, pulleys, joints, projectiles and hinged components; unity of design – originality, use of color, symmetry of creativity, fully developed concept diagrams – comprehensive and detailed; an overall diagram of completed model with key elements labeled, of moving part(s) or independent component; explanation/written report – of design process, difficulties encountered and their solutions, description of play value, future expansion of project and overall presentation.
4. Model Demonstrating a Mechanical Science Concept Projects must be original, no kits and can include level arms, gears, pulleys, friction, belts, airfoils (flight, wind), catapults and load bearing bridges and beams. Science concepts can include energy transfer, stress analysis, Newton’s Laws, gravity, etc. Entries in this class must include a working model, an equation describing a principle of science, a labeled diagram of the project and written explanation of the science involved. Evaluation will also include presentation and visual impact of the project. Youth may conduct experiments with model and provide written report. Judging criteria: working model that demonstrates a principle of mechanical science, must move or work as necessary, scientific equation that relates the principle, including clear definition of each term with equation displayed; labeled diagram provided that labels major parts of the model and also notes how parts or movement relates to equation; written report (no more than 2 pages) which explains the principle and how model illustrates the principle (may include additional page of experimental results using the model); written explanation that explains design and construction of the model, including any difficulties and how they were overcome, description of the principles of mechanical science that is demonstrated, clear understanding of scientific principles and explanation of how the model illustrates principle; and overall visual impact of project as prepared for display, including attractiveness of display.
5. 3D Printing General Information: 3D printing uses plastic or other materials to build a 3-dimensional object from a digital design. Youth may use original designs or someone else’s they have re-designed in a unique way. Youth must bring their finished printed object. Exhibits will be judged based on the complexity of the design and shape. Must include the following:
 - a. Software used to create 3D design.
 - b. Design or, if using a re-design, the original design and the youth’s design with changes.
 - c. Orientation that the object was printed.
6. 3D Prototypes – 3D objects printed as part of the design process for robot or other engineering project. Must include statement of what design questions the prototype was supposed to answer and what was learned from the prototype.
7. 3D Unique Objects – 3D objects printed for their own sake. May be an art design, tool, or other objects.

GEOSPATIAL SCIENCE

Exhibits that show skills and knowledge learned through 4-H GPS and GIS projects.

8. GIS Maps: Maps made using ESRI (Environmental Systems Research Institute, Inc.) Arc GIS software or other mapping

software. Criteria and Guidelines for Community Mapping Projects can be found on NYS 4-H web page: <http://nys4h.cce.cornell.edu/about%20us/Pages/4-HGeospatialScience.aspx>. GIS map exhibits may be selected for display competition sponsored by NIFA and National Geographic Society.

9. GIS or GPS Project or activity: may be undertaken by individual or group. Exhibit may be in form of project record book, photo documentation, video, CD, DVD, etc. Exhibit must include project report documenting statements of purpose and outcome of project activity.

IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS) CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport (conduct) themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada. The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must be present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials. (Health Certificates are not required for Nemaha County Fair.)
3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock show.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflect the conditions of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
